Dear Fellows,

During fiscal year 2023, the Foundation awarded grants totaling \$555,000, including 100% of the total contributed this year by Fellows as well as approximately \$156,000 from the Foundation's reserve fund.

Contributions to the Foundation from Fellows during fiscal year 2023 totaled \$399,399, which was down slightly from last year. Unlike most charities, **the Foundation uses all contributions for charitable purposes during the current fiscal year with no deduction for administrative expenses, fundraising or any other purpose.** The Fellows' contributions are supplemented by a distribution of approximately 5% of the Foundation's reserve. The reserve also covers the Foundation's administrative expenses, which compared to other charities, are negligible. As a result, there is no more efficient way to contribute to charity than through a contribution to the ACTL Foundation.

The entire Board would like to express its sincere appreciation to our outgoing President, Joan Lukey. During Joan's three-year tenure as President, the Foundation's annual grant awards increased from approximately \$400,000 to nearly \$600,000. This significant increase was made possible by the generosity of the College's Fellows, the revision of our spending policy and the improved performance of our investments due to changes in our asset allocation. And these are only a few of the accomplishments the Foundation was able to achieve under Joan's gentle but deft leadership. We would also like to thank Kathleen Flynn Peterson who shared in these accomplishments as a Trustee but who retired from the Board this year. In addition, we would like to welcome Joe R. Caldwell, Jr., Henry E. Klingeman and Rodney Acker who are joining the Board of Trustees to help advance the Foundation's vital work.

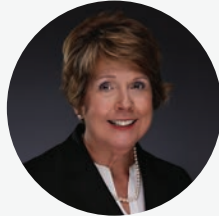

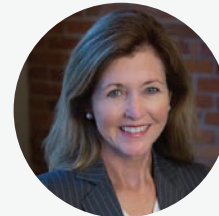

Innocence Project New Orleans—Second Chance at Life Initiative

The state of Louisiana holds the dubious record of having the highest incarceration rates per capita, not just in the United States, but even higher than those of Cuba, Iran and Russia.

The Second Chance at Life Initiative of Innocence Project New Orleans (IPNO) will provide parole representation to people serving excessively long or life sentences in Louisiana who are newly eligible under the recently passed Act 122. Act 122 of the Louisiana Legislature allows parole eligibility after 15 years for nonviolent offenses with a life sentence. However, in Louisiana, there is no statutory or state constitutional right to postconviction representation (except in very limited circumstances), and no statutory right to attorney representation at a parole hearing, even though having an attorney almost doubles your chances of a successful hearing.

Since its founding in 2001, IPNO has freed 44 innocent people from prison who spent over 1,033 years incarcerated between them. Their Unjust Punishment Project seeks justice for those given inhumane sentences for crimes that are often symptoms of poverty, addiction, and mental illness. Through litigation and other advocacy, they have secured the release of sixteen people serving life sentences who spent a combined total of 273 years in prison.

The Emil Gumpert Award, named for the founder of the College, is accompanied by a Foundation-funded grant of \$150,000 dollars. It is the largest annual Foundation grant, and the recipient program must be one whose principal purpose is to maintain and improve the administration of justice.

“IPNO is grateful to the ACTL for the opportunity to free more people from prison who deserve a second chance,” said Jee Park, Executive Director, IPNO.

“Because of ACTL and its Gumpert Award, more individuals will be represented at their parole hearings, significantly increasing their likelihood to be granted parole and be given a second chance at life after decades in prison. The Gumpert Award is providing hope and opportunities to rebuild to those sentenced to excessive punishment due to addiction and poverty.”

Bobby Wallace (and his brother) as he walks free for the first time in 16 years. Bobby Wallace served 16 years of a life sentence for possession of cocaine. Police found cocaine under a couch cushion in someone else's house—Mr. Wallace happened to be in the home, and he was arrested and prosecuted for the cocaine, as was everyone else who was in the house. There was so little proof tying him to the cocaine that the members of the jury could not agree on whether or not he should be convicted.

But in Louisiana, a non-unanimous vote was enough to send him away for life. Mr. Wallace's case was one of the first that the Unjust Punishment Project took up because his sentence was excessive based on the crime and unfair based on the evidence against him. Despite the injustice of his situation, Mr. Wallace earned multiple vocational trades, worked in the prison library, mentored others, and became a trustee. He plans to use the skills he learned in prison to work at a flooring company and will volunteer at a youth organization in the neighborhood he grew up in.

Project One Vet @ A Time (POVAT)

Heroes. The founders and volunteers of POVAT epitomize that word. Most are veterans who fought for their country and for our freedoms. Yet when they retired from active service needing medical and psychological assistance for service-related injuries, it was denied to them. Co-founded by a Fellow of the College, POVAT assists veterans to advocate for the compensation and benefits that they earned and deserve from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. The Foundation's grant will enable POVAT to assist approximately 13 additional veterans, who, as a result, are projected to receive approximately \$6.3 million in total additional disability compensation benefits.

Just The Beginning—A Pipeline Organization

The cost of law school and unpaid internships is prohibitive to economically disadvantaged students, preventing many law students from pursuing unpaid summer legal internships in a judge's chambers. This lack of financial resources excludes many of these students from gaining important mentoring and networking opportunities that could have long-term positive impacts on their legal career. Supplemented by an additional gift of \$25,000 from the College, this Foundation grant provided modest stipends for ACTL Summer Judicial Interns. These summer interns worked in the chambers of federal and state judges, gaining real-life insights into professional opportunities in the legal system. JTB administers this program in collaboration with the College's Mentoring Committee, which identified more than 90 Fellows willing to mentor JTB federal judicial interns this past summer.

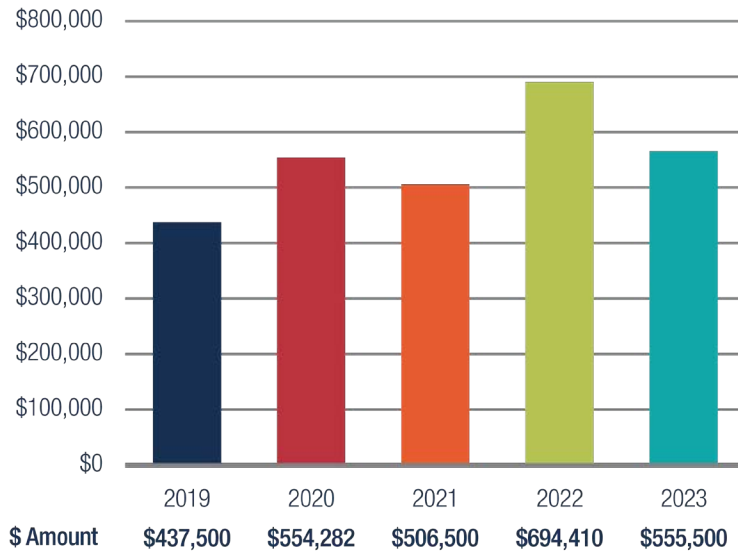

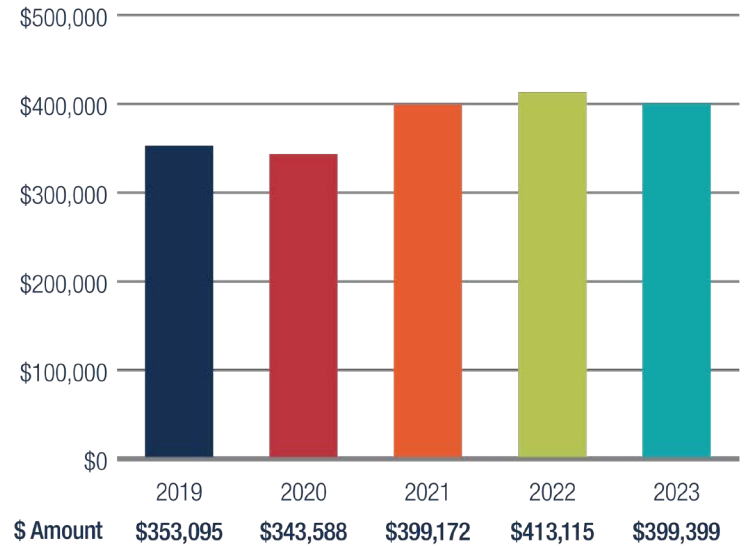

For Fiscal Years Ending June 30, 2019 through June 30, 2023

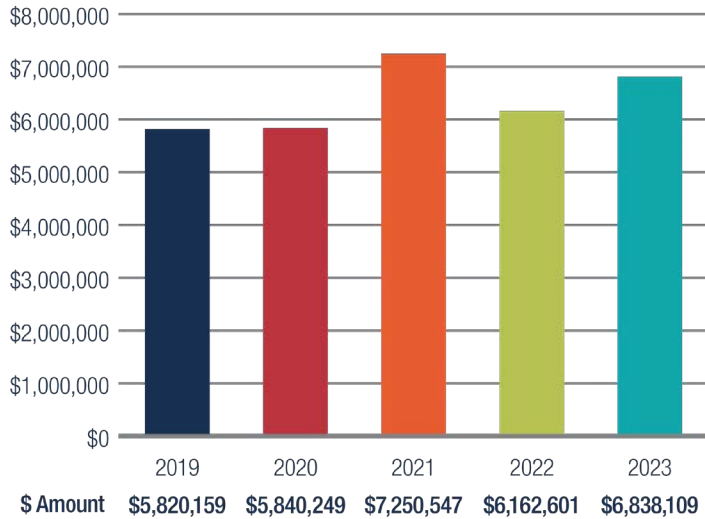

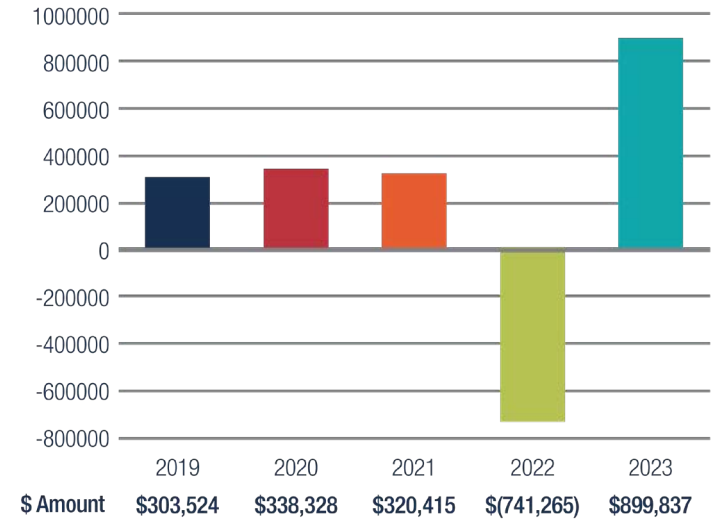
Net Assets

For Fiscal Years Ending June 30, 2019 through June 30, 2023



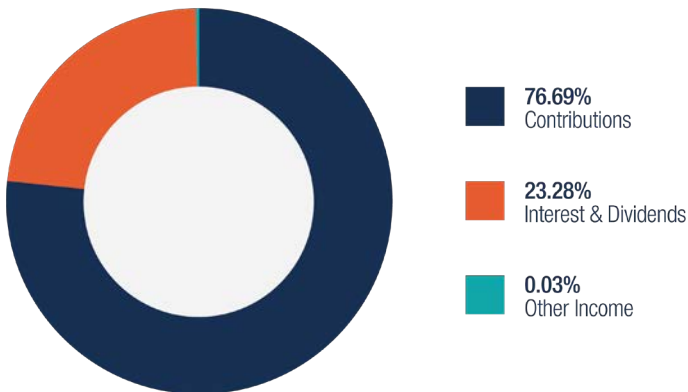
Unrestricted Investment Income

For Fiscal Years Ending June 30, 2019 through June 30, 2023



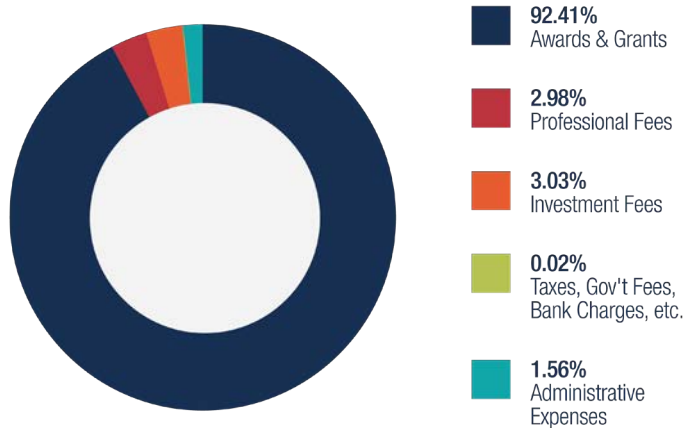
Revenue

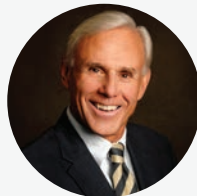

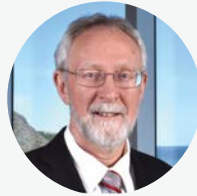
